Organizers who seek permission from the Foundation in advance may use the Foundation or Louise Marshall Hospital name and logo. Using brands like names or logos without permission is illegal. (Every year scams mislead people and the Foundation wants to protect its supporters.) As

tion before participating. When an event is not registered with the Foundation, it casts a doubt on what may be someone's very good intentions.

When the Foundation is connected, events are promoted within the hospital (hospital policy only allows fundraisers supporting the hospital to be promoted within its walls). Events appear on the "Coming Events" page of the Foundation website. If a conflicting event potentially could affect success, our staff can help. Best of all public recognition for hard work will give a boost to the next event.

Registering an event is easy and only needs to be done once in writing. Subsequent notifications can be phoned in.

### Surgery and other areas at Louise Marshall Hospital will soon have a new standard in patient care

Breathing can be taken for granted. But at Louise Marshall Hospital (LMH), it never is.

In 2014-15, Operating Room (OR) staff decided to investigate new technology to aid patients with breathing during surgery.

Called "intubation" a physician inserts a tube to manage breathing during certain procedures or conditions. While the way this currently is done has been successful for many years, a new device is available that includes a small camera to guide physicians to see a full view of the throat. This amazing technology means much faster intubation and results in less time spent in surgery for patients.

Approval to fund the purchase of this new equipment was given by The Mount Forest Louise Marshall Hospital Foundation (LMHF) last year.

In the process of attaining quotes, staff learned that one model called a "McGrath -MAC" (MAC) was so well-priced that three devices could be purchased for the same value.

Throughout the hospital, three departments perform intubation. If the procedure was standardized in all three areas, staff could use the same procedure consistently. Purchasing three MACs was prudent and would represent a new standard of care throughout the hospital. Since this is great news for patients, it is a pleasure to share this information with everyone who depends on LMH!



# **Three are Better than One!**

#### McGrath - MAC in 3 areas at our Hospital

laryngoscope is used to manage a patient's airway. A small camera and powerful light source located at the end of a device is inserted and "takes a look around" the curves of the larynx (throat). It transmits a colour video display onto a monitor, guiding the physician during this "intubation" process. Placing three devices throughout the hospital means this process will be easily performed wherever

it needs to be done.

Enhancing the view in special circumstances like a child's small mouth or in adults with breathing difficulties, the device can be easily manoeuvered and reduces time to manage the airway.

Not every patient requires the use of a MAC but for those needing this special equipment, it greatly increases patient care and comfort.
